Don **Ramm**, CS-19, sent in a new "There I was" story about flying T-34s in formation at March Air Reserve Base. In his words:

"I fly with the March Aero Club which has a "fleet" of T-34s (4 of them and sometimes all four of them are "up" at the same time). We do flybys for parades, special events, and lots of committal services. Most of the time the flybys we do for a fallen veteran are at Riverside National Cemetery which is literally across the street from March ARB. Recently we got a call for a flyby at the Miramar National Cemetery which is off the end of the runway at MCAS Miramar. After our second pass (1<sup>st</sup> pass diamond at end of Taps, 2<sup>nd</sup> pass fingertip/missing man) as we were departing, as casually as I could, I said "Tower, this is Hog Flight, request a flyby". I expected "Negative, Hog Flight, the pattern is full" or "Get the heck out of my airspace". Instead he said something about right downwind for runway 24...which is where we were. There was other chatter on the radio and – I learned in the debriefing -- I apparently missed a call from the tower that cleared us for right base runway 24. They were going to let us make a pass down the runway. Damn! If I hadn't been predisposed to getting my butt chewed out I might have really had something to tell the kids about. We did turn the smoke on as we flew past the tower north of the field. Beautiful smokers, our T-34s.

In the last column, I reported that Chip **Frazier**, CS-02, had suffered significant flooding at his house not far from Offutt AFB. He sent in an update you can read in the expanded online column. The good news is that though the flood scotched the pending sale of the house when it hit on 14 March, they were able to sell it later. They are moving to North Carolina but considering maybe not living only two blocks from the beach. Having survived one flood, no need to tempt fate and hurricane flooding. Here's his update.

"The "Nebraska Floods of 2019" (some say it was a 500-year flood) that swamped NE, MO, & KS on 14 March, hit the Frazier lake house rather hard. We lost the entire lower level of our home to Platte River and Hanson's Lake #3 water that rose 15 feet above the normal level. We had 78" in our basement that receded over 5 days, but the upper level, our main living space, was untouched! When we were evacuated on 16 March, we were welcomed into our son's home 10 minutes away for the following nine weeks. Ed & Cory, (both Class of '99) and their children, Beck and Ashleigh, provided a welcomed diversion to dealing with our loss. We were warm, dry, and safe. When we moved back into our home on 24 May, we had replaced the mechanical infrastructure (HVAC, plumbing, and basic electrical) thanks to financial relief from FEMA and the Small Business Administration. "As if the demands of losing and repairing a basement were not enough, am also the Chairman of the Sanitation Improvement District for our community of 320 homes (kind of a village-type government). It was up to me to lead this community back to some semblance of normalcy. Together with Sarpy county, FEMA, countless volunteer groups from all over the country, and a hard core of fantastic neighbors, we were able to protect our dike and restore our roads and sewer service. Once again, this community proved that moving here 24.5 yrs. ago was the right choice. Good people, kindness to strangers, patience, whatever we needed, there was someone there with it. Mostly, it was love and caring for one another that got us through.

"Prior to the flood, we had a contract to sell our house with a closing on 30 April. We were moving to a lot we were purchasing on Oak Island, NC and then taking a couple of months to walk the 500 mile El Camino de Santiago across northern Spain in the Fall. We lost that contract due to the flood and refocused our efforts on flood recovery. Ironically, the day we moved back in, we closed another deal to sell our house 'as is' to a young couple who wants a more affordable home and will refinish the basement. The new closing date is 15 July.

"Although we have seriously reconsidered our desire to live two blocks from the Atlantic Ocean, we are still bound for the Southport, NC area on or about 17 July. If you are en route to NC, we may beg a bunk from you in exchange for a meal and precious time together. With God's continued blessing, we will pick up our plans to walk the Camino on schedule."

The local Colorado '73 group also celebrated our arrival at USAFA, in addition to half a dozen other events in the past quarter. Some involved our Legacy Class, the Class of 2023, which in-processed on 27 Jun and was sworn in the following day. On May 22, seven classmates, two classmates' widows, and honorary class member Brig Gen (Ret) Mal Wakin placed class pennants at our classmates' gravesites at the USAFA Cemetery. The next day, five classmates placed American flags on the graves for Memorial Day. Names of participants and descriptions of those and other activities are in the expanded column on the website. If you're in the area and aren't participating, you're missing some great camaraderie.

On 22 May, the following placed class pennants at our classmates' gravesites at the USAFA Cemetery in preparation for the next day's flag-placing event: Class President Ron **Scott**, CS-34; Dale **Birch**, CS-39; Donna (Charlie) **Felton**, CS-10; Steve **Lorenz**, CS-15; Tom **Mayberry**, CS-16; Bob **Munson**, CS-34; Charlie **Quinnell**, CS-27; Nancy Stewart, widow of Valedictorian Clay **Stewart**, CS-02; and Honorary Class Member Brig Gen (Ret) Mal Wakin. The next event, sponsored by Wreaths Across America, is a countrywide effort on Saturday, December 14.

This summer, '73 participated in several events with our 50-year Legacy Class, the Class of 2023. Classmates from as far away as Wisconsin, North Carolina and Northern Virginia joined us locals as we talked with parents, participated in honor lessons, attended a couple of parades, marched back from Jack's Valley with the basics, and more.

At In-Processing on 27 June, the new basics were given a special edition of Contrails that identified the Class of 1973 as their legacy class (the term legacy class is used for both '73 and '23). Ron Scott's dedication from '73 was prominently placed in the front of the book, ahead of even the current Superintendent's letter. We also contributed about half of cost of the publication of the Contrails to upgrade the binding. As a result of budget cuts over the years, the quality of the binding had been downgraded to paperback and was so poor that pages were falling out by the end of 2nd BCT. We decided to remedy that for 2023. We weren't able to get the cover embossed as ours was, but we were able to get it published with a hard cover and sewn binding.

As the arriving cadet candidates were were kept rather busy during in processing at the Field House by the Academy staff and cadet cadre, we were asked to interact with parents at the AOG's Doolittle Hall. About 10 of us mingled with parents as they wandered among various tents and booths and the Heritage Trail. Many were quite interested in talking with us, especially first-time parents. (I was surprised how many multiple-cadet families there were.) Of course, there were a few verklempt mothers who were already missing "little Johnny," as Rich **Fazio** likes to refer to the generic fledgling who has just left the nest. One über-helicopter mother related she had installed an app on her son's phone that would allow her to see just where he was in the Cadet Area all day long. Don't guess she got the memo that he wouldn't have his phone at all during BCT.

The next day was the Oath of Office Parade. About 20 assorted classmates and family members attended. How things have changed. 
